What Is This?

Rose Woods Dance Collaborative is a performance art-focused dance theatre company founded by New England dancers and choreographers, Jenna Gross and Jillian MacLaughlin. Their work approaches social commentary through pantomime-inspired comedy and absurdism. The main focus of their choreographic work is to make serious topics into jokes and to take jokes seriously. Jenna and Jillian are striving to bring New England comedic levity in dance. Their work brings together the excitement of full bodied athleticism while maintaining dramatic physicality.

On Sunday, April 7, Rose Woods Dance Collaborative will be presenting "They Sat There, Feeling Happy Together", a theatrical modern dance performance at the Maine Jewish Museum in Portland ME. The movement behind this show is inspired by the choreographers' favorite childhood stories written by Jewish authors. This performance will highlight the work of Arnold Lobel (Frog and Toad), Shel Silverstein (Where the Sidewalk Ends & A Light in the Attic), and Maurice Sendak (Where the Wild Things Are). RWDC will dive into the pages and bring audiences on an escape to the whimsical worlds inside of these iconic childhood stories.

Before the show, RWDC will be hosting a free movement workshop for kids 6 and up. This workshop will demonstrate the creative tools they used to make "They Sat There, Feeling Happy Together". Students are encouraged to bring their favorite book(s) to help them create their own movement.

The creation of "They Sat There, Feeling Happy Together" has been a collaborative effort of dedication and passion. RWDC's collaborative team consists of six performers, two musical composers, and countless generous mentors behind the scenes. RWDC's mission at its core is to create an equitable working environment for artists with compensation that reflects justly for their invaluable contribution to the art. With that in mind, this work has been fully self funded by RWDC's founding directors, Jillian Maclaughlin and Jenna Gross, without any additional financial support from grants or organizations. director of Rose Woods Dance Collaborative. When Jenna is not dancing she can be found knitting, creating ceramic pieces, or acquiring another craft hobby.





A Midwest native, Jennifer Binversie began her dance training at the Jean Wolfmeyer School of Dance and continued on scholarship at the Virginia School of the Arts, later graduating from the Alabama School of Fine Arts under the direction of David Keener. Growing up, her summers were spent studying at various dance intensives, most notably Interlochen Arts Camp, Atlanta Ballet, and Hubbard Street Dance Chicago.

Upon graduating from the University of Hartford- Hartt School, Binversie began dancing overseas in the South Pacific aboard Holland America Cruise Line. Returning to the U.S. in 2017, Binversie accepted the position as head of the dance department at a private boarding high school in downeast Maine, where she developed a new curriculum for the dancers and brought abstract movement to an isolated community.

To present, her performance career has included works by George Balanchine, Antony Tudor, Martha Graham, Jose Limon and Isadora Duncan. Binversie is also an active company member of Dances for Isadora performing classical Duncan technique and Rosewood Dance Collaborative.

While consistently eager to grow in her teaching knowledge, Binversie has completed educational teacher trainings at various institutions such as the Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet as well as Boston Ballet's Adaptive Dance Teacher Training, where she has consistently been a guest presenter.
